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**ENFORCEMENT ACTION FOR ALLEGED VIOLATIONS COMMITTED BY SHORELINE DRILLING CO., INC. (778501), AS TO THE HENDERSON-STATE (084072) LEASE, WELL NO. 2, AND THE HENDERSON-STATE (168172) LEASE, WELL NO. 1, LABBE (1900) FIELD, DUVAL COUNTY, TEXAS**

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**FINAL ORDER**

The Commission finds that after statutory notice the captioned enforcement proceeding was heard by the examiner on April 10, 2003, and that the respondent, Shoreline Drilling Co., Inc. (778501) , failed to appear or respond to the notice. Pursuant to § 1.49 of the Commission's General Rules of Practice and Procedure [Tex. R. R. Comm'n, 16 TEX. ADMIN. CODE § 1.49] and after being duly submitted to the Railroad Commission of Texas at conference held in its offices in Austin, Texas, the Commission makes the following findings of fact and conclusions of law.

**FINDINGS OF FACT**

1. Shoreline Drilling Co., Inc. (778501), ("Respondent") was given Notice of Opportunity for Hearing by certified mail, addressed to the most recent P-5 address on the Form P-5 Organization Report, which was signed and returned to the Commission.
2. The returned certified receipt (green card) that was attached to the Original Complaint and the Notice of Opportunity for Hearing was signed and returned to the Commission on February 27, 2003. The receipt has been on file with the Commission for 15 days, exclusive of the day of receipt and day of issuance.
3. On June 8, 1999, Respondent, a Corporation, filed an Organization Report (Form P-5) with the Commission reporting that its officers consisted of the following individual(s): R.V. Davis; President.
4. Respondent designated itself to the Commission as the operator of Well No. 2 on the Henderson-State (084072) Lease and Well No. 1 on the Henderson-State (168172) Lease ("subject wells"/"subject leases") by filing a Form P-4 (Producer's Transportation Authority and Certificate of Compliance) with the Commission effective on February 1, 1999 for both of the subject wells and subject leases.

5. According to Commission records the Respondent's Form P-5 (Organization Report) became delinquent on June 1, 2000. Respondent paid a fee of \$750.00 as financial assurance at the time of its last Form P-5 renewal.
6. The subject wells ceased production on or before May 31, 1998 for Well No. 2 on the Henderson-State (084072) Lease and October 31, 2000 for Well No. 1 on the Henderson-State (168172) Lease.
7. The subject wells were not properly plugged in accordance with, and were not otherwise brought in compliance with, Statewide Rule 14 in a timely manner.
8. Usable quality groundwater in the area could have been contaminated by migrations or discharges of saltwater and other oil and gas wastes from the subject wells. Unplugged wellbores constitute a cognizable threat to the public health and safety because of the probability of pollution.
9. The Respondent did not demonstrate good faith since it failed to plug or otherwise place the subject lease and the subject wells in compliance in a timely manner after being notified of the violations by the District Office and failed to appear at the hearing to explain its inaction.
10. Form P-4 's (Producer's Transportation Authority and Certificate of Compliance) were filed with the Commission transferring the Henderson-State (084072) Lease and the Henderson-State (168172) Lease to Rock Resources, Inc. (722939), effective on March 1, 2003.

### **CONCLUSIONS OF LAW**

1. Proper notice was issued by the Railroad Commission to respondent and to all other appropriate persons legally entitled to notice.
2. All things necessary to the Commission attaining jurisdiction over the subject matter and the parties in this hearing have been performed or have occurred.
3. The subject wells were in violation of Commission Statewide Rule 14(b)(2) until March 1, 2003.
4. Respondent was responsible for maintaining the subject leases in compliance with all applicable Commission rules and for properly plugging the subject wells according to Statewide Rules 14, 58, and 79 and Chapters 89 and 91 of the Texas Natural Resources Code.
5. The documented violations committed by the respondent constitute acts deemed serious, a hazard to the public health, and demonstrate a lack of good faith pursuant to TEX. NAT. RES. CODE ANN. §81.0531(c) (Vernon 2001).

**IT IS ORDERED THAT** within 30 days from the day immediately following the date this order

becomes final:

1. Shoreline Drilling Co., Inc. (778501), shall pay to the Railroad Commission of Texas, for disposition as provided by law, an administrative penalty in the amount of **FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$4,000.00)**.

It is further **ORDERED** by the Commission that this order shall not be final and effective until 20 days after a party is notified of the Commission's order. A party is presumed to have been notified of the Commission's order three days after the date on which the notice is actually mailed. If a timely motion for rehearing is filed by any party at interest, this order shall not become final and effective until such motion is overruled, or if such motion is granted, this order shall be subject to further action by the Commission. Pursuant to TEX. GOV'T CODE § 2001.146(e), the time allotted for Commission action on a motion for rehearing in this case prior to its being overruled by operation of law, is hereby extended until 90 days from the date the order is served on the parties.

All requested findings of fact and conclusions of law which are not expressly adopted herein are denied. All pending motions and requests for relief not previously granted or granted herein are denied.

Noncompliance with the provisions of this order is subject to enforcement by the Attorney General and subject to civil penalties of up to \$10,000.00 per day per violation.
